A Message from the Board

Dear Neighbors,

Twenty years ago, in 2002, the Woodridge Community Association held a program called "Surviving the Construction Around Us." At the time, we heard about improvements to I-405, particularly the addition of a proposed fork in the exit ramp at SE 8th Street and the flyover ramp to 116th Avenue SE to help northbound traffic flow into Bellevue. We learned about improvements to Richards Road and Kamber Road to mitigate flooding and we found out that there would be new zoning underway for Factoria, allowing for construction on the mall property. The question was posed: "Does it all make you wonder how you will ever get out of Woodridge?" and the City of Bellevue agreed to continue to seek our input and consider our neighborhood needs.

This all sounds like it could be a discussion held today (and, in fact, it is) with a few of the particulars changing, but the general issues staying very much the same. For many years, the Woodridge Community Association has been a conduit of information and a way for our neighbors and us to connect over issues impacting the neighborhood. One of the primary functions of any community association is to inform the residents of any proposed changes by city, county, or state government that would affect their neighborhoods. Such items as zoning changes, group home ordinances, multi-family building permits, school closings and construction, and traffic mitigation are all items that were communicated in the time I was on the WCA board.

The Woodridge Community Association typically holds two community meetings a year and, with the help of Boy Scout Troop 662, distributes this newsletter (in addition to now posting a digital copy of it on our website: woodridgebellevue.com

While I am moving off the WCA board (after serving the community for 25 years, having first been elected to the board in the fall of 1997), I know that the other board members will continue to represent Woodridge well. It is my sincere hope that some of you reading this message will contact our WCA president, Erin Kenway, at woodridgebellevue@gmail.com, and volunteer to serve on the WCA board. I know you will find it rewarding and I promise you do not have to serve for 25 years like I have.

Back to School Safety

The return of the school year brings more activity and traffic in and near school zones, especially around the morning and afternoon bell times. For Woodridge Elementary peak traffic times are 8:40-9:00am daily; 3:15-3:35pm M, T, Th, F; and 1:15-1:35pm on Wednesdays.

Please be mindful that early arrivals result in longer traffic back ups along SE 20th Street.

Please be mindful of the following safety tips:

- ♦ Slow down and watch out for kids walking, biking and rolling, especially at intersections, crosswalks and when entering and exiting school parking lots.
- ♦ When picking up or dropping off children at school, park responsibly and follow parking laws. Parking within 30 feet of a stop sign, within 20 feet of an intersection or within 5 feet of a driveway is not allowed. Stopping in the middle of the street for drop-off/pick up is unsafe for kids and can create unnecessary traffic jams.
- ◆ Adhere to the 20-mph speed limit in school zones.
- ◆ If you are commuting, find alternative routes around schools to avoid traffic congestion during arrival and dismissal times.
- ◆ Pay attention while driving; don't be distracted by using electronic devices.



Trick or Treat

Trick-or-Treating around the Woodridge neighborhood has been a beloved tradition for many generations. On **Monday, October 31st** the streets of Woodridge will be filled with children looking to fill their Halloween bags with candy! Below are some important reminders to keep you and your families safe, while enjoying this annual tradition...

5:00pm until 8:30pm

Most ghouls and goblins will be roaming the neighborhood during this time.

Safety Reminders:

- * Bring flashlights and/or wear glow-in-the-dark accessories.
- * Always walk on sidewalks or gravel paths. On streets with no sidewalks, walk facing traffic.
- * Do not trample through people's front yards.
- ◆ Use crosswalks and only cross the street at street corners.
- * Never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.
- + Stay in groups.
- * Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.
- * Slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods.

Other considerations:

- * Consider providing peanut-free treats, or toys, for children with allergies.
- * Some people are afraid of dogs, consider leaving your furry friends home while trick-or-treating, and secure dogs when answering the door.

Proper Yard Maintenance

Trees - As our days grow shorter and leaves begin to turn, it's time to think about preparing our yards for the upcoming seasons. Strong winds are very common here on the hill. These winds regularly cause tree branches to brake off and cause damage. Homeowners are responsible for the damage caused by trees originating on your property - yes, even if the wind caused those branches to break off. Fall is a great time to check your trees for weak branches. Thinning reduces density of the tree branches. This not only increases light penetration, but also increase air movement through the canopy and reduces weight. Thinning tree canopy decreases the chances of strong winds and snow breaking branches - the most common cause of power outages on the hill. Trimming trees with branches over sidewalks can also keeps our community safe! Snow, ice, and strong winds can make those branches dangerous for pedestrians of all ages.

<u>Snow</u> - Snow is also becoming a regular occurrence up on the hill. During a snowstorm, City of Bellevue crews work around the clock to plow streets. Designated priority streets are cleared first to accommodate fire, medical and police response, transit, school buses and commuter traffic. It is every property owner's responsibility to clear sidewalks adjacent to their property of snow - it is the law.

<u>Freeze</u> - When temperatures dip below freezing, it is important to insulate outdoor faucets, outdoor pipes, as well as pipes in unheated garages and crawl spaces, with insulating material.

<u>Dog Poop</u> - It's unsanitary, gross, disrespectful, and illegal to not clean up after your pet. Failing to clean up after your pet, especially when it snows, can cause serious health risks to our environment. When snow water melts, it takes the feces with it and pollutes our streams.

You are Responsible for Keeping Sidewalks Clear

See Bellevue City Code 14.06, et al.

Where trees, plants, shrubs, vegetation or parts thereof overhang any sidewalk or street, or public right-of-way, it is the duty of the owner of the property to trim, destroy or remove such overhang. Refusal to comply may result in various penalty imposed by the City of Bellevue, including fines and other remedies.

Asking Nicely Should be Enough - Please Comply with CC&Rs

Compliance with Covenants is the legal obligation of each homeowner. Over the years, residents throughout the neighborhood have **not** kept tree heights at or below the 15-foot height restriction set out in most covenants. Other divisions require even more restrictions on yard maintenance.

Also known as CC&Rs, covenants are automatically renewed legal contracts disclosed to you in your title documents prior to closing on the purchase of your home. You have agreed to abide by these covenants, or contract terms, simply by purchasing your home.

If your neighbor(s) demand compliance of you, please respect these requests. Where there are both Bellevue and CC&R regulations, *both* regulations must be satisfied. In other words, **the most restrictive regulation governs**. Failure to comply may result in expensive legal fees and other legal remedies should your neighbor(s) decide to pursue enforcement for noncompliance.

Contrary to rumors, the CC&Rs are still valid today. Some provisions within the CC&Rs have been voided by law (e.g. restrictions on roofing materials), but this does not void the remainder restrictions. Failure to enforce CC&R violators does put their validity at risk! It isn't being unneighborly - it is actually your responsibility as a homeowner to insist on compliance. And if asking nicely doesn't work, it is your right to file a civil lawsuit against them.

Crime & Safety Report

Over the summer, there have not been any specific crime trends in Woodridge. Across the city, however property crimes are still above a normal range. Most of this elevated trend is being driven by Catalytic Converter Thefts, though these types of crime have been trending downwards recently.

Shoplifting and Motor Vehicle Prowl-related thefts from June to July are also trending down. Bellevue police are still running into sporadic issues in various neighborhoods with Motor Vehicle Thefts, Mail Thefts, and Package Thefts. Officers cannot stress to residents enough the importance of vigilance and to call 911 if they see anything suspicious.

Bellevue Police has a new internal crime dashboard. With this new dashboard, officers are able to be more intentional in directing investigative and responsive efforts using the data and crime patterns to put together emphasis patrols or operations to decrease crime in a specific area. This is why they need residents to report incidents, so they know where crime is taking place.

Report Crimes Online

The Bellevue Police Department's online crime reporting system allows you to submit a police report immediately and print a copy of the report for free.

Please confirm the following to find out if reporting a crime online is right for you:

- This is not an emergency
- This incident occurred within the Bellevue city limits
- There are NO known suspects
- This did not occur on a state freeway

Crime Prevention Tips For the Winter Months

Fall has arrived and with it, daylight savings time will end. With darkness falling earlier., all those activities previously done in daylight will now occur in darkness: Going to your vehicle after work, picking up your children from after school activities and sports. Not to mention that many complete their holiday shopping in the evening. In the winter, evenings at 5 p.m., will be as dark as if it is 9 p.m. Below are a few crime prevention tips from BPD's Crime Prevention Officer Ruby Daly, to make the transition easier.

Vehicle Security- There are things you can do to lessen the odds of being a victim of car theft. Many thieves are opportunists and will look for the vehicle that is unlocked, or the one that may be locked but contains valuables inside. Even if your vehicle is locked and alarmed, if there are valuables in sight (even covered up) a window may be smashed to gain entry. This all can occur in a matter of seconds. Don't make it easy for them: • Never leave the keys inside the vehicle. • Make sure that all windows are up all the way before locking your vehicle. • Lock your vehicle even if you are only going to be away from it a short time. • Lock your vehicle even if it is parked in your driveway, inside your garage or on the street in front of your residence. DO NOT leave your vehicle running while you run inside to grab that second cup of coffee, it takes seconds for someone to jump in and drive off with your vehicle. • Make sure your vehicle alarm is activated whenever you exit/lock your vehicle. • Do not leave valuables, (i.e., purses, wallets, cellular phones, cameras, laptop computers etc.) inside your vehicle, even if it is locked. • Even if your vehicle is locked and alarmed, do not attempt to "hide" valuables under the seat or under an item of clothing in the vehicle. • Please report any theft from your vehicle immediately to the Police. If you observe anyone acting suspiciously in the area of your vehicle, call 9-1-1.

Home Security- Ensure that porch lights are functioning and that motion lights are coming on during hours of darkness. It's also a good time of year to mark your calendar as a reminder to update your alarm company with current contact information. It is a good habit to always lock your doors to your house, *even when you are home*. If you are leaving for work and it is dark outside, have your keys in your hand rather than digging for them in your purse or backpack and park in well-lit areas. Pay attention and don't be distracted by looking down at your cell phone or listening to music. **If you see someone that is acting suspicious, call 9-1-1.**


